It seems like a long time since we welcomed the Sunshine children into the class. It was only January. I'm pleased to say that they have slotted in beautifully and have been full of enthusiasm for all they've received.

This term has flown by and we've been busy laying the foundations for all their learning.

The realm of numbers and their qualities have been explored. In the latest number block the children were introduced to some of the characters living in a circus. They've met the family of mice who find themselves becoming part of the tightrope walker's act. This helped introduce the concept of the equals sign.

In the next number block they will meet more characters in the circus stories that help introduce the four processes.

In literacy they've met most of the letters and more recently the vowels. Once again these are introduced through stories that anchor the letters in the pictures.

Class 2/3 have been very busy this term. We began with learning about the stories from the Old Testament, painting the days of creation and developing our writing as we learned more about these stories.

After this we have been using our bodies in practical ways. First by learning about ancient methods of measurement, using different parts of the body. The children

teamwork to measure out a kilometre from school (which conveniently ended near a play park!).



Practical workshops included clay brickmaking and wattle and daub.



CLASS 4/5









Class 4/5 have done some wonderful work this term. We enjoyed learning the stories the Gods, Goddesses and heroes of Indian Mythology, finding interesting comparisons with our Norse Myths and stories from the Old Testament.

In our circle time, we have enjoyed learning some Indian songs using percussion such as the dhol, cabasa, crotales and tambour. We have developed our ability to follow notation and to keep different rhythms.

Next, we returned to our learning about Fractions, revisiting challenging concepts such as equivalent fractions, multiplying and dividing with fractions using stories and games.

After half term, we explored the signs of Spring on the land and began to explore our Botany topic, as the Earth began to breathe out. We investigated what elements plants need to grow and learnt about the different parts of plants and what they do.

For World Book Day, we prepared book review presentations and dressed up as characters from the books. It was a joy to share hot chocolate, cakes and swap books together.

We have begun learning about the history and geography of Nottingham through stories of the early people who settled here and what resources attracted them. We have learnt about how the Saxon and Norman areas of the town developed and changed through time. We walked to town and experienced some of the places we talked about, which really challenged our resilience.

Another highlight was celebrating the Greek Orthodox festival of Clean Monday. We shared wonderful mezzo on the land, made and flew kites together.

Well done Class 4/5 for all of your efforts. We are so proud of all the progress you are making and of all of the brilliant things you have achieved.

The Big Water Walk

All the classes turned out last Friday in the breezy sunshine to attempt a challenge - one that faces the children at the Beseka School in Addis Ababa in Ethiopia on a regular basis - to walk up to 5 kms to access clean water.

Not knowing what to expect, the children tallied each completed lap of our playground that they either walked or skipped (each lap being approximately 150 metres).

There was a wonderful atmosphere of laughter and chatter as their tally charts grew and Charlie from class 5 reached the 5km mark with time to spare! Sure enough by the end, there were pupils from each class making that mark too. Nevertheless, regardless of number of tallied laps every child had a personal best and every single lap counted towards the raising of money for this very worthwhile cause.

Some children took turns carrying baskets of water, just like the children of the Beseka School would do, adding to the experience of knowing how it feels to walk such a long way, to turn on a tap for clean water - and to appreciate how very lucky we are.

What is The Iona Club? The Iona Club is a private lottery

Why should I join the Iona Club? It is a great way to raise funds for the benefit of Iona school; in particular

- For a sustainable restoration of the school buildings To assist community supported places To support children who may otherwise be prevented from participating in the school activities.

It pays out cash prizes via monthly prize draws. Approximately 50% of all monies collected go into the prize fund. Prizes will be drawn 12 times a year. Two of these draws (June and December) will be super draws.

What are the prizes? The prizes are worked out as a percentage of income. The monthly standard draws will be made up of 30% of that month's income with 20% of the income being carried forward to the super draws.

- 1st prize will take 15%
 2nd prize will take 10%
 3st prize will take 5%

The super draw prize fund will be made up of 50% of that month's income plus up to five month's carried forward prize money as follows:

- 1st prize will take 50% 2nd prize will take 30% 3nd prize will take 20%

How does it work? You buy a number that is exclusive to you. Every month a prize draw takes place where the winning number is randomly selected by an electronic number generator.

How much does it cost? Each number costs £60 per year payable by standing order of £5 monthly in advance. The standing order monies must be received by the 10th day of the month of the draw to be eligible. Please do NOT send cash or cheques.

Who can join? Membership is open to all. Including: parents and grandparents of current and past students, staff and retired staff, Old Ionians and trustees. All members must be aged 18 or over and may only have one subscription.

How do I join and pay? Simply fill out the Iona Club application form and the standing order mandate. Detach the Standing Order Part B and send this part to your own Bank. Hand in or send Part A to the Treasurer Iona Club, the Iona School.

Do I need to remember my number? No. A list of numbers and members will be stored on the Iona School database

Can I witness the prize draw? Yes.

Where and when are the prize draws? The prize draws will take place on the 28th day of each month or the first working day thereafter at Iona School. Please check the Iona School website for draw dates.

How do I know if I have won? Winners will be notified be email and the number announced on the website

How can I cancel my Iona Club membership? Members may leave the Iona Club at any time giving three months' notice in writing. No subscription monies will be returned and the member's draw number will continue to be drawn until the subscription expires.
